The Holocaust Memorial Assembly:

26th January 2024.

This week, the pupils of Saint Anne Line embarked on a historical journey, learning, and uncovering the genocide from the atrocious past. The assembly was led by the Faith Council, who specialise in religious matters. The 79th Holocaust Memorial appreciation was held on Wednesday the 24th of January 2024. At 9:30am, the school convened in the hall, listening to poignant music, and paying their respects to the victims. As expected, not much laughter or clapping was involved, due to the sorrow and discrimination that occurred around 80 years prior.



GUILTY or NOT GUILTY?!

At around 12:00 on Wednesday 24th January, various members of the Pupil Council and Digital Leading Committee went on a trip to Chelmsford County Court regarding an actual, real-life case: Maria Ivanova versus Selina Khan.

According to one of the participants, Judge Andre Borja recounted: "It was a great experience, and I never would have known cyber bullying would have such drastic consequences." Many other attendants support this statement, agreeing with the fact that it was incredibly **drastic**. The defendant was charged with:

- Death threats
- Harassment
- Underage use of SNAPCHAT

A Digital Leader reported that the event was a scripted court case, and influential to many youths who have been involved in this kind of activity. The defendant, Selina Khan (14), was found guilty of the crime receiving a £200 fine from the judge-going down as the first case of cyber bullying in court.
