Catholic Social Teaching

Catholic Social Teaching is all about understanding that God has a special plan for each and every one of us, and this plan is not just about spiritual things or religious activities. In our school, we teach children about seven important principles of Catholic Social Teaching. We talk about these principles in our lessons, during special events, and in our everyday actions at school.

At St. Anne Line Catholic Junior School, we make sure that Catholic Social Teaching is part of what we learn every day. We ask children to think about how they can show their faith through their actions, and we talk about these teachings during our times of worship. This helps us see how these teachings are important in our lives today.

Catholic Social Teaching is like the foundation of our school life. As members of the Catholic Church, we are all asked to respect every person, take care of our world, and help those who need it. Pope Francis tells us that it's important to work together to make the world fairer and more peaceful, to show love through what we do. It's really important for our children to understand how Jesus' teachings connect with doing good things for others.

Themes of Catholic Social Teaching

Human Dignity

We need to understand that we're all like a big family, and that means we should treat each other with kindness and respect. Every person, including ourselves, is special because we are made in the image and likeness of God. This means we all have value and deserve to be treated well.

Community and Participation

One way Catholics show togetherness is by working together for the good of everyone in the community.
